MEASURE A: San Diego County Road Repair, Transit, Traffic Relief, Safety & Water Quality Measure Enacts a 40-year half-cent local sales tax dedicated to repairing infrastructure, improving traffic and expanding public transit throughout the county.

MEASURE B: Ordinance Amending the County General Plan, County Zoning Map & County Code, Adopting the Lilac Hills Ranch Specific Plan

Approves the Lilac Hills Ranch Specific Plan, which approves the proposed development of a 608-acre master-planned community. The community includes over 1,700 dwelling units, three commercial centers, and open land in Northern San Diego County.

MEASURE C: Downtown Stadium Initiative ("Chargers Initiative")

Increases San Diego's hotel occupancy tax by 6% to build a City-owned, jointly used, football stadium and convention center in downtown San Diego.

MEASURE D: Facilities & Tourism Tax Initiative ("Briggs Initiative")

Increases San Diego's hotel occupancy tax up to 5%; eliminates the Tourism Marketing District; allow hoteliers to self-assess and use those funds for a downtown convention center, and not for a stadium; prohibits the contiguous expansion of the existing convention center, and allows for the sale of the existing Qualcomm stadium.

MEASURE E: Charter Amendment Regarding Qualifications, Vacancy & Removal For Mayor, City Attorney & Council

Requires the Mayor, city attorney and City Council members to resign if they are convicted of a felony, found liable for fraud or declared incapacitated by a court; creates a new process to removed elected city officials convicted of misdemeanors.

MEASURE F: Charter Amendment Regarding Required Term of Service For Certain Terminations or Suspensions of Deputy City Attorneys

Reduces the probationary period for deputy city attorney new hires to a single year; extends job protections to deputy city attorneys after one year on the job.

MEASURE G: Charter Amendments Regarding the Citizens' Review Board on Police Practices Changes the Citizens' Review Board on Police Practices to the Community Review Board on Police Practices; requires the board to review all deaths that have occurred in the custody of San Diego Police Department and all police related shootings.

MEASURE H: Charter Amendments Regarding Purchasing & Contracting Processes for the City of San Diego

Allows City of San Diego to lease Balboa Park land to San Diego High School to ensure the school can

Streamlines and improves process for contracting with the City of San Diego.

MEASURE I: Charter Amendment Regarding Balboa Park & San Diego High School

MEASURE J: Charter Amendment Regarding Use of Lease Revenue From Mission Bay Park

Extends voter approved initiative to dedicate Mission Bay Park lease revenues for capital improvements in San Diego Regional Parks through 2069, allowing for potential bonding and improvements to Plaza de Panama and other regional park needs.

MEASURE K: Charter Amendment Requiring Run-Off Election for the Offices of Mayor, City Attorney & Councilmember

Requires a run-off election at the November general election between the two candidates who received the most votes in the primary election, even if a candidate successfully secures 50+1% of the vote during the primary election.

MEASURE L: Charter Amendment Requiring Citizens' Initiative & Referendum Measures to be Placed on November General Election Ballots, Unless the Council Decides to Submit Them to Voters Earlier Requires that all qualified citizens' initiative and referendum measures be submitted to voters during the November general elections ballot and removing the option for placing on primary ballots.

MEASURE M: Affordable Housing: Increasing the Limit on the Number of Units the City & Certain Public Agencies are Allowed to Help Develop

Increases the cap on the number of affordable housing units the City and other public agencies can develop construct or acquire to 38,680. It does not approve, obligate or otherwise require the units

MEASURE N: Non-Medical Cannabis Business Tax

remain in its current location.

Should Proposition 64 pass on the state ballot, Measure N would levy a tax on recreational marijuana businesses operating within San Diego. Funds would cover city regulatory costs and impacts of marijuana legalization.

PROPOSITION 51: School Bonds: Funding K-12 School & Community College Facilities

Authorizes the state to issue \$9 billion in general obligation bonds to fund K-12 educational facilities, including facilities for Community Colleges.

PROPOSITION 52: Medi-Cal Hospital Fee Program

Increases to a two-thirds vote to allow the Legislature to amend statutes that impose fees on hospitals (for purpose of obtaining federal Medi-Cal matching funds) and directs those fees and funds to hospital-provided Medi-Cal health care services, care for uninsured patients, children's health coverage.

PROPOSITION 53: Revenue Bonds. Statewide Voter Approval

Would require a statewide election for every public infrastructure project exceeding \$2 billion.

PROPOSITION 54: Legislature: Legislation & Proceedings

Requires that all proposed legislation be published online and viewable for at least 72 hours prior to the Legislature's vote. Also requires that legislative meetings be recorded and available online to the public within 24 hours of being held.

PROPOSITION 55: Tax Extension to Fund Education & Healthcare

Extends Proposition 30 (2012), which raised the personal income tax on incomes over \$250,000, for another twelve years.

PROPOSITION 56: Cigarette Tax to Fund Healthcare, Tobacco Use Prevention, Research & Law **Enforcement**

Increases the cigarette tax by \$2.00 per pack, with equivalent increases on electronic cigarettes and similar tobacco products.

PROPOSITION 57: Criminal Sentences. Parole. Juvenile Criminal Proceedings & Sentencing.

Expands parole eligibility for felons convicted of non-violent crimes and provides increased credits earned for good behavior. Allows judges to decide whether a juvenile will be tried as an adult in court.

PROPOSITION 58: English Proficiency. Multilingual Education.

Repeals Proposition 227 (1998) which required children with limited English ability to be taught predominantly in English. Proposition 58 would allow for schools to utilize dual-language immersion for native and non-native English speakers.

PROPOSITION 59: Corporations. Political Spending. Federal Constitutional Protections

Seeks advisory opinion of voters to generate political pressure to ultimately overturn Citizens United, which holds that the First Amendment allows for independent political expenditures by a nonprofit corporation.

PROPOSITION 60: Adult Films. Condoms.

Requires the use of condoms by actors during sexual intercourse in adult films.

PROPOSITION 61: State Prescription Drug Purchases. Pricing Standards.

Prohibits the state from paying more for a prescription drug than the lowest price paid by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and removes negotiating power for said prescription drugs.

PROPOSITION 62: Death Penalty

Repeals the death penalty, thereby making life without parole the maximum punishment for the crime of murder. If both Prop 62 and 66 are approved, the one that has the most votes will take effect.

PROPOSITION 63: Firearms. Ammunition Sales

Prohibits the possession of large-capacity ammunition magazines, and requires most individuals to pass a background check prior to purchasing ammunition.

PROPOSITION 64: Marijuana Legalization

Legalizes recreational marijuana and hemp and establishes a 15 percent sales tax in addition to a cultivation tax.

PROPOSITION 65: Carry out Bags. Charges.

Redirects all revenue from the sale of carry-out bags by grocery and retail stores to the new environmental fund called the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Fund, managed by the Wildlife Conservation Board.

PROPOSITION 66: Death Penalty. Procedures.

Changes procedures governing challenges to death penalty convictions and sentences in an attempt to address the backlog on death row by expediting review. If both Prop 62 and 66 are approved, the one that has the most votes will take effect.

PROPOSITION 67: Ban on Single-Use Plastic Bags

Ratifies legislation from 2014 prohibiting larger grocery stores and retail stores from providing single-use carryout plastic bags, but permits the sale of recycled paper and reusable bags and retention of the proceeds.
