

County's Business Outlook Optimistic; Infrastructure a Concern in City

Having bounced around the mid-20s during the past half year, the February Business Forecast, sponsored by Silvergate Bank, shows the Business Outlook Index™ (BOI) following suit at 26.5. This month's Forecast also sheds light on the quality of infrastructure throughout the county.



This month we asked business people to rate the condition of the infrastructure (streets, sidewalks, sewers, and bridges, etc.) near their place of work. Overall, infrastructure across San Diego County received mixed reviews. The chart below details business people's reviews on infrastructure, but analyzing the data shows that those involved in finance, arts and culture, and healthcare view the infrastructure near them as in very good or excellent shape. Conversely, companies involved in maintenance, for example, typically judge the infrastructure they contend with as less than good. None of those maintenance operations are located in areas where infrastructure is considered to be excellent.



In addition, looking at sentiment based on geographic area, we find that one out of every six businesses located in the city of San Diego rate infrastructure as poor or terrible and 40% believe it is less than good. Outside the city limits, concern about infrastructure is generally mild. When asked if they would back a one penny sales tax increase for 15 years if the money were devoted to fixing infrastructure, support was strongest from firms in San Diego. Fifty-seven percent of businesses in the city support such a measure, and 37% do so strongly. However, outside the city, 54% of businesses would oppose such an increase. As a whole, half of county businesses support the one cent increase.

To look at it by BOI, those struggling businesses with a BOI at less than -12.5 would oppose an infrastructure sales tax by 76%. This reinforces the idea that raising the sales tax is more viable when economic times are good and optimism is high. Among County businesses that are not strongly pessimistic, support stands at 54%.

Within this month's stable outlook are some variances. Examining the BOI by industry sector shows that the transportation/automotive segment had a significant uptick this month. Conversely, health, beauty and fitness companies – which were at the top last month – dropped back down reporting a BOI of 13. Healthcare firms have also slumped and are down to 9.4.

Issues at play for healthcare business are the Affordable Care Act and government regulations. Issues related to government are shared by 23% of San Diego County businesses as well. The following word cloud illustrates those issues businesses identify most frequently as new challenges this month.
