




## Foreign-born Population in the City of San Diego

The foreign-born population in the City of San Diego is approximately **344,000**.

Approximately **154,000** San Diegans live in mixed-immigration status households.




## Foreign-born Population in the City of San Diego

#### **Country of Birth**

The foreign-born population in the City of San Diego comes from at least **115 countries** and territories.

With respect to region of birth, 43.7% of this population was born in Latin America, 42.9% was born in Asia, and 6.3% was born in Europe.



## Foreign-born Population in the City of San Diego


#### Languages

The foreign-born population in the City of San Diego speaks at least **70 different** languages and dialects.

The main languages spoken are:

- Spanish
- Filipino/Tagalog
- Chinese, including Mandarin and Cantonese
- Vietnamese

**Approximately half (50.9%)** of the foreignborn population in the City of San Diego are Limited English proficient (LEP).




## Immigrants at the Frontlines of the COVID-19 Pandemic
