<u>Immigrants in the U.S. and California</u>



- In 2023, immigrants in California paid \$168.1B in taxes and held \$404.4B in spending power.
- In California, 93.3% of undocumented immigrants are of working age. In 2023, they paid \$21B in taxes and held \$65.9B in spending power.
- Despite making up 27.3% of the total population, immigrants comprised 32.7% of the workforce in California.
- More than 46% of companies—including 28
 California-based companies—on the 2024

 Fortune 500 list were founded by immigrants or their children.

<u>Immigrants in San Diego County and Metro Area</u>

- In 2019, immigrant households in the San Diego Metro Area earned \$30.3B in income, paid \$5.8B in federal taxes, \$2.9B in state and local taxes, and held \$21.6B in spending power.
- Immigrants represented 23% of the population in the San Diego Metro Area but comprised 38% of administrative support workers, 35.9% of transportation and warehouse workers, and 33% of manufacturing workers in 2019.
- As of 2019, 77% of foreign-born immigrants in the San Diego Metro Area were of working age (between ages 16 and 64).
 Of those 25 years and older, 19.3% had a bachelor's degree, and 13.8% had a master's degree.
- In 2018, immigrants in San Diego County paid \$7.7B in taxes and held \$19.3B in spending power. Despite only making up 23.6% of the population, immigrants made up 8% of entrepreneurs in San Diego County.
